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8. ABCD is a cyclic quadrilateral (see Fig. 3.7). Find the angles of the cyclic quadrilateral.


Solutions: It is known that the sum of the opposite angles of a cyclic quadrilateral is $180^{\circ}$
Thus, we have
$\angle \quad \angle C+A=180$
$4 y+20-4 x=180-4 x+$
$4 y=160 x-y=-40$
...............(1) And,
$\angle \quad \angle \mathrm{B}+\mathrm{D}=180$
$3 y-5-7 x+5=180$
$-7 x+3 y=180$
Multiplying 3 to equation (1), we get
$3 x-3 y=-120$
Adding equation (2) to equation (3), we get
$-7 x+3 x=180-120$
$-4 x=60 x$
$=-15$
Substituting this value in equation (i), we get $x$
$-y=-40$
$-y-15=-40$
$y=40-15$
$=25$
$\angle \mathrm{A}=4 \mathrm{y}+20=20+4(25)=120^{\circ}$
$\angle B=3 y-5=-5+3(25)=70^{\circ}$
$\angle C=-4 x=-4(-15)=60^{\circ}$
$\angle \mathrm{D}=5-7 \mathrm{x}$
$\angle D=5-7(-15)=110^{\circ}$
Hence, all the angles are measured.
